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*The senior notebook is a comprehensive resource for students designed to help you navigate the college admission and financial aid processes while fulfilling Program requirements according to established deadlines. The information reinforces, and in many instances is complementary to, communication posted in the Crosby Scholars Student Portal. Seniors will benefit most from the notebook by using it alongside other Crosby Scholars resources.*

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## Senior Program Requirements

To graduate high school as a Crosby Scholar, you must complete the following requirements. Your Senior Advisor will guide you!

- Submit Target List of Colleges to Crosby Scholars Senior Advisor
- Complete the College Fair/College Visit requirement<sup>^</sup>
- Complete 5 hours of Community Service and Submit Form<sup>^</sup>
- Complete 1 Senior Academy
- Meet with Senior Advisor to complete all Conference Notes
- Submit at least 1 College Application\*
- Complete the Residency Determination Service (RDS)\*
- Complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)\*
- Submit a Last Dollar Grant Application or at least 1 Scholarship Application

<sup>^</sup> College Fair/College Visit may be completed in Sophomore or Junior years. Community Service may be completed in Junior year.

\* Your Crosby Scholars Senior Advisor can provide alternative ways to fulfill this requirement.

### And continue to:

- Agree to random drug-screening
- Fulfill terms of Partnership Agreement
- Maintain enrollment in and graduate from a Forsyth County public school
- Complete the Program with a cumulative weighted GPA of 2.0 or higher to be eligible to apply for Last Dollar Grant funding.

## Senior Advisor Program

All Crosby Scholars seniors have an individual Senior Advisor who meets with them throughout the school year as they navigate the college admission and financial aid processes. Whether assigned or self-selected, Senior Advisors provide support and expert knowledge on all aspects of college admission. Senior Advisors submit conference notes to the Crosby Scholars office after every meeting so that program staff can review student progress and provide additional advice or support as needed.

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## Senior Academies

Crosby Senior Academies are offered through December of senior year, and students must attend at least one. Check your student portal for topics, dates, and times. Academy pathways direct you to specific topics based on your individual need or interest. Scholars are welcome to choose academics from among the range of pathways and are welcome to attend all of the sessions covering a specific topic.

You must register through your Crosby Scholars Student Portal, and registration is not complete until you see the confirmation page. In order to receive credit for attending a Crosby Senior Academy, scholars must do the following:

- Register online
- Arrive at the academy/log into a webinar on time
- Sign in at on-site sessions
- Stay/remain online for the entire session
- Submit a confirmation of attendance form at the end of the session

Students can also receive Senior Academy credit by participating in qualifying Crosby Scholars programs such as: the essay review program, mock interviews, partner agency webinars and presentations.

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## Essay Review

Scholars can submit their application or scholarship essays to [seniorprogram@crosbyscholars.org](mailto:seniorprogram@crosbyscholars.org) for feedback. Typically, three volunteers will read and critique your essay(s) within a week. [Click HERE](#) to read the full instructions to submit your college admissions essays for feedback. Submitting an essay for review before December will count for Senior Academy credit.

## Mock Interview

One-hour mock interviews are available to assist students in preparing for admission and/or scholarship interviews. Scholars can bring their resume for review during this time. [Click HERE](#) for instructions on scheduling a mock interview. Students who complete a Mock Interview before December will receive Senior Academy Credit.

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## Test Prep

The SAT and ACT are standardized tests used in the college admission process and can be a significant factor in admission decisions. Crosby Scholars offers a variety of prep opportunities for both tests that emphasize test taking strategies and completing practice problems. In addition, we will assist you in creating a specific plan for further test prep through ACT Academy or Khan Academy as your goals dictate. Research indicates that focused test prep often leads to improved scores; therefore, Crosby Scholars encourages all seniors to take advantage of both group and individualized sessions in preparing for the ACT and/or SAT.

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## Financial Aid Counseling

Applying for financial aid and understanding the many nuances of the award process is one of the most critical aspects of college admission and enrollment. Crosby Scholars' Financial Aid Coordinator is available to meet individually with families to provide advising and has created a series of documents to help students and families understand the financial aid process and Crosby Scholars' Last Dollar Grant funding. 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## **Senior Honors Gala**

Each spring, the Program hosts an honors gala to celebrate the accomplishments of seniors. Seniors in attendance from all participating high schools are recognized individually, and the student in the Program with the highest GPA overall receives the Michael Nachman Scholarship. Seniors with the most community service hours and those who enrolled in the Program in the 6th grade and remained through 12th grade without interruption while completing all requirements are also acknowledged.

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## Executive Director's Award

Seniors who enrolled in the Program in the 6th grade and remained through 12th grade without interruption while completing all requirements will receive the Executive Director's Award. This means that the student did not miss any deadlines, they were not dismissed and reinstated, or they did not reapply to the program in grades 7-10 after being dismissed for missing a requirement. All requirements must be met on time without discrepancy.

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## Crosby Scholars Last Dollar Grant (LDG)

**The Crosby Scholars Last Dollar Grant is need-based financial aid. A scholar must apply for financial aid by submitting a FAFSA to be considered for a Last Dollar Grant.** (If you are not eligible to complete a FAFSA, please contact our office directly for instructions on how to apply.) Students must demonstrate not only financial need but also remaining need after the school of choice has awarded aid. To determine eligibility, the Crosby Scholars staff completes a need analysis form on each scholar individually.

Crosby Scholars who complete the Program their senior year with a cumulative GPA of 2.0 or higher are eligible to apply for a Last Dollar Grant for up to 4 years of undergraduate study within 6 years of high school graduation. Even if a Last Dollar Grant is not awarded the first year, the student may still reapply 3 more times. **Students must reapply each year, even if they were awarded the LDG in year(s) prior.**

A student who does not graduate from high school with a cumulative GPA of 2.0 or higher, may apply once his/her college cumulative GPA is 2.0 or higher.
